A Message from the **Board President**

On March 29, 1916 at 11:00 a.m. the first meeting of the *Worcester Girls Club House Corporation* was held in the office of Justice of the Peace John Thayer in the State Mutual Building in Worcester. Twenty-three women with a common vision came together for this meeting. Their mission was clearly stated in the original Articles of Incorporation. "The Corporation is constituted for the purpose of providing a place or places in the city of Worcester where working girls of all nationalities, creeds and political beliefs may meet on a common ground to receive free of expense or at moderate cost ethical, educational and social advantages which might not otherwise be open to them under such favorable conditions....." To help these civic minded women realize their vision and to memorialize her husband, Mrs. Henry F. Harris gave her home to be used as a clubhouse for the working girls of Worcester sixteen years of age or older. This was the beginning of the Worcester Girls Club. In 1924, assessing the needs of the city's younger girls and their demand to be a part of the Girls Club, these corporators decided to invite girls six and up to be members. As with most successful organization's there were many changes that would take place in the years to come.

Ninety One years later as one of the original founding affiliates of the National organization our mission, a paraphrasing of the organization's original, is to inspire all girls to be *Strong, Smart and Bold.* Today 70% of the girls that we serve are girls of color, 66% live in households with an annual income of less than \$25,000 and 49% of our girls live with only one parent. The majority of these households are headed by women. While much has changed in our world since the organization's inception in 1916, our mission is timeless. We proudly offer superior research based *gender specific* programming to over 5,200 girls annually. We continue to strive in building strong community partnerships, reaching out to girls in under and un-served areas of our community as well as providing programming in the community and in the public schools.

This year our girls, staff and board were fortunate to be part of some very notable accomplishments:

- Sister-to-Sister Summit in partnership with the AAUW, YWCA and YouthNet funded by the Women's Initiative. Over 80 girls attended the program designed to discuss issues facing girls today, moderated by young college women.
- She Votes Program: Over 100 girls participated in an event that sparked local media coverage.
- Taking Steps to End Violence against Women and Children in collaboration with the Rape Crisis Center and the YWCA.
- Pool Renovations: Through the generous support of the Albert Gifford Charitable Trust and The George F. & Sybil H. Fuller Foundation our pool received major equipment renovations.
- Girls Celebration Event: Through the generous support of Emerson Investments this event raised a substantial profit that extended gratis camp privileges to many inner city children this past summer.
- Camp Kinneywood: Construction of 24' by 64' pavilion in memory of Orville R. Harrold, past president of the Providence and Worcester Railroad. This project was made possible in part by donations from the Worcester Kiwanis Club and a benefactor of Girls Incorporated. This is the first addition to the camp in over 70 years.

Today, Girls Incorporated of Worcester has entered into a very exciting transition phase, a transition with a clear mission. Through the dedication of a visionary board of directors and staff coupled with a very sound business and development plan we look forward to continuing to empower girls and an equitable society while counting up to our 100th anniversary and beyond!

2007 Program Highlights

This past summer Lincoln House began two new collaborations with the **Girls Scouts**, to help build self-esteem, encourage healthy body image and teach leadership skills, and with **UMass Extension**, a program that provided nutritional education to our youth.

Tools for Teens at Winthrop House partnered with the Worcester Center for Crafts to help girls ages 12-14 increase their confidence by exposing them to and informing them of the proper uses and handling of tools such as ban saws, sanders, and planers.

A new partnership was developed between **Camp Kinneywood** and the **Greater Worcester Land Trust** -**Cascading Water nature trail.** This allowed several of our campers to hike along with their staff to learn about the natural environment along the hiking trails.

The **YouthNet Computer Clubhouse** provided over 700 girls and boys this past summer an opportunity to utilize state-of-the-art technology, with an upgrade made possible by the **George I. Alden Foundation.**

Girls and boys ages 5–12 from **Kids Klub** took a day trip in August to **Canobie Lake Park** in Salem, NH, to share time together and celebrate the end of a great summer program.
