WHO WE ARE

Founded in 1916 as the Girls Club of Worcester, Girls Inc.'s mission is to inspire all girls to be strong, smart, and bold. We put our mission into practice through the people, places, and programming that together empower girls to succeed.

For more than 100 years, Girls Inc. has provided gender-specific programming to thousands of local girls. Programs are designed to provide all girls with the six essential elements of the Girls Inc. experience: mentoring relationships, intentional programs, girls-only environment, sustained exposure, interactive activities, and research-based curricula. The organization delivers programing at our Providence Street center, community partner sites, and virtually for girls in the Greater Worcester area. During the school year, trained staff deliver programming to girls at the organization's urban-based facility after school, as well as onsite/virtually for as many as eight local district/charter public schools during the school day. In the summer months, girls are served at the Providence Street facility and our seasonal outdoor facility, Camp Kinneywood.

Year-round, girls receive life-changing experiences and solutions to the unique challenges they face with the goal of providing skills and knowledge to set goals, overcome obstacles, improve academic performance, explore non-traditional fields, and know that college and careers are attainable.

PROGRAMMING

Eureka! Worcester

Eureka!, is a year-round, five-year STEM intensive program that engages and empowers 8th-12th grade girls as they develop confidence and discover leadership and academic opportunities in STEM fields. Monthly cohort meetings focus on promoting inclusivity in STEM, leadership skills, and life skills for girls ages 12-18.



Eureka! JV Worcester

Eureka! JV introduces girls in grades 5-7 to the exciting world of STEM, leadership development, and health & wellness. Through monthly cohort meetings, students ages 9-12 participate in hands-on STEM experiences designed to spark curiosity and build foundational skills.

This program serves as a natural pathway into the five-year Eureka! model, giving younger girls the opportunity to discover their passion for STEM before applying to the full program. By engaging girls with the diverse possibilities within STEM fields at an earlier age, we aim to inspire a new generation of young women who are excited about pursuing STEM careers.

Eureka! Metrowest

Eureka! is a five-year, year-round STEM intensive program that empowers 8th-12th grade girls to build confidence, discover leadership potential, and explore academic opportunities in STEM fields. Serving the MetroWest region—including Ashland, Framingham, Hopkinton, Marlborough, Natick, and Wayland—we're committed to fostering the next generation of women in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

Through monthly cohort meetings, girls ages 12-18 engage in activities that promote inclusivity in STEM, develop leadership skills, and build essential life competencies. Our program leverages strategic site-based partnerships throughout the MetroWest area, with cohorts meeting regularly at The McAuliffe Center at Framingham State University, Framingham Public Schools, and The Boys and Girls Club of MetroWest.

Eureka! Summer

Eureka! is a 5-year program with each year of the program offering a different summer experience.

Year 1: Team and Community Building with a variety of STEM activities.

Year 2: College visits and tours.

Year 3: Day in the Life, where each day is a different field trip to a different STEM organization, women owned business, and/or businesses within our community.

Year 4: Students complete externships based on their interests and are compensated with a \$1000 stipend for their work.

Year 5: Participants are required to use their connections and skills they have made through the program to find an internship based on their interests.



Girls Promoting Safety (GPS)

GPS is a collaboratively led program with the YWCA of Central Massachusetts taught in Worcester Public Schools and Abby Kelley Foster Charter School. Staff from Girls Inc. and the YWCA facilitate this program in middle schools during the school day's enrichment period. The program focuses on domestic violence prevention by teaching healthy communication, healthy relationships, stress management, conflict resolution, resisting peer and media pressure, bullying prevention, what sexual harassment and relationship violence are, and what to do when facing either, both as an individual or when seeing a loved one/friend in those situations.



Girls Unified

A joint program with Knox Trail Middle School in the Spencer East Brookfield School district that is run afterschool once a week for 2 hours at the school. The program runs from early October until mid June, finishing with a full day field trip to the Girls Inc. location in Worcester for swimming, baking, and other available activities that would be difficult to bring to the school. The program focuses on healthy living and violence prevention with units on teambuilding, healthy communication, healthy relationships, healthy cooking (and cooking safety, including knife safety), stress management, mental health, conflict resolution, resisting peer and media pressure, bullying and sexual harassment, social media safety, and American Red Cross Babysitter training. Staff work closely with school staff to adapt the curriculum to meet the school community's needs.

YouthConnect

In collaboration with other youth serving agencies around the city of Worcester, Girls Inc. of Worcester provides free after school and summer programming to girls ages 11-15, including Summer Nights. The program provides a variety of offerings ranging from Swim Lessons, Summy Olympics, Spa Nights, Cooking Lessons, Karaoke, and full access to our after school programming.







After School

In our After-School Program, we offer our participants various activities including swimming, gym games, outdoor play, homework help, and clubs that participants could choose from. The clubs vary from arts and crafts, jewelry making, CEO advisory, fashion club, inner beauty, STEM, sports clubs, and cooking. Participants are able to choose the club based on their wants and needs.



Wellness and Equity

WE offers 1:1 support for staff and participants, group workshops, and staff trainings/education. The department leads family engagement events, focuses on behavior management through an equity lens and restorative justice practices, and oversees the overall wellbeing of the organization.

Enrichment

After hours, we offer additional Basketball Skills and Drills and Swim Lessons. Parents and caregivers have the opportunity to register their child for additional sessions in the evening for enrichment.



Summer Camp Providence & Camp Kinneywood

Summer camp is offered to girls ages 5-12 years old. Last summer, there were 75 girls that enrolled and attended Camp Kinneywood and Providence St camp for six weeks. Activities include boating, swimming, kayaking, arts and crafts, lawn games, smores, STEM, and team building exercises.



Vacation Weeks Camp

Vacation weeks are offered to girls ages 5-12 years old at our Providence St location. This past year, we had 70 girls enrolled in our vacation weeks program. Activities include physical activities, arts and crafts, STEM, team building exercises; Social-Emotional Learning activities are conducted with all girls daily. Participants made lemon volcanoes, clay faces, face collages, and more. The FY25 themes were African American STEMinists for February participants, and Girls Go Green for April participants.




